TO

Enable the Rector of the Parish Church of Hitcham, in the County of Bucks, to exchange Part of his Glebe Lands there, for other Lands in the same Parish, belonging to the Right Honorable William Wyndham, Lord Grenville.

Arts, Rector of the Parish and Parish Church of Hitcham,

And in the County of Bucks, and within the Diocese of

Lincoln, is, in Right of his Rectory, seized of certain

Glebe Lands, within the said Parish.

And whereas the Reverend Jonathan Davies, Doctor in Divinity, Provost of Eton College, in the said County of Bucks, with the Fellows of the said College, are as such, Patrons of the Advowson of the said Rectory, and the Right Reverend Father in God George, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, is Ordinary of the said Diocese.

and whereas Part of the faid Glebe Lands confift of the Four several Pieces or Parcels of Land or Ground hereinaster mentioned, which together, are of the Yearly Value of Seventy Pounds Nineteen Shillings and Ten-pence; and lie near to the Lands of the said William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, and, at an inconvenient Distance, not only from

from the Parsonage House, but from the other Glebe Lands belonging to the said Rectory.

and twhereas the faid William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, is feized of, or otherwife intitled to the Fee Simple and Inheritance in Possession of, and in several Closes, Pieces, or Parcels of Land, situate in the said Parish of Hitcham, called or known by the several Names of Oaken Marsh, Oaken Marsh Meadow, Lower Fourteen Acres, Upper Fourteen Acres, and Sheep House Close, and are of the Yearly Value of Seventy-two Pounds Nine Shillings; and the whole of the said Lands belonging to the said William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, are at present Tythe-free, by Virtue of an Act of Parliament passed in the Eighteenth Year of his present Majesty, which is hereinaster mentioned, and lie near to the said Parsonage House, and more convenient to the other Glebe Lands belonging to the said Rectory.

And whereas the said Thomas Pulton and William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, have (with the Consent of the said George, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, and of the said Provost and Fellows of Eton College, aforesaid, Patrons of the Advowson of the said Rectory) agreed to make an Exchange of the said Closes and Parcels of Land hereinbefore mentioned, to belong to them respectively as aforesaid; But although such Exchange will be for the mutual Convenience of the Rector of Hitcham, for the Time being, and the said William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, and for the Advantage of both their Estates, yet the same cannot be established and rendered effectual, without the Aid of Parliament.

Talherefore your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the said Thomas Pulton and William Wyndham, Lord Grenville

Do most humbly bescech YOUR MAJESTY

That it may be Enacted; and he it Chatted by the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That all those the said Closes, Pieces, or Parcels of Land, commonly called or known by the several Names, and containing the respective Quantities, hereinaster mentioned (that is to say) Oaken Marsh, containing Nineteen Acres and Thirteen Perches, or thereabouts: Oaken Marsh Meadow, containing Eleven Acres, Two Roods, and Twenty-six Perches, or thereabouts;



Lower Fourteen Acres, containing Thirteen Acres, Two Roods, and Thirty-one Perches, or thereabouts; Upper Fourteen Acres, containing Fourteen Acres and Twelve Perches, or thereabouts; and Sheep-house Close, containing Eight Acres, Three Roods, and Thirty-two Perches, or thereabouts; which faid last mentioned Closes, Pieces, or Parcels of Land, are fituate, lying and being in the Parish of Hitcham aforesaid, and now are in the Possession of Mr. Joseph Langton; together with all and singular Hedges, Ditches, Gates, Styles, and Fences, Ways, Passages, Waters, Watercourses, Woods, Underwoods, Timber Trees and other Trees, Commons, Common of Pasture, Profits, Emoluments, Advantages, Hereditaments, and Appurtenances whatfoever, to the faid Closes of Land and Premises, belonging, or in anywise appertaining, or accepted, reputed, taken, or known, as Part, Parcel, or Member thereof, or of any Part thereof; and the Reversion and Reversions, Remainder and Remainders, Rents, Issues, and Profits, of the same Premises, shall, from and immediately after the paffing this A&, be fettled upon and vested in, and the same are hereby settled upon and vested in the said Thomas Pulton, and his Successors, Rectors of the said Parish and Parish Church of Hitcham aforesaid, for ever, to the Use of him the said Thomas Pulton, and his Successors, Rectors of the faid Parish and Parish Church of Hitcham aforesaid, and as Part and Parcel of the Glebe of and belonging to the faid Rectory, in Lieu of, and in Exchange for, the faid Pieces or Parcels of Glebe Land, hereby vested in the said William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, and his Heirs and Assigns, as hereinaster mentioned.

and be it further Enasted by the Authority aforesaid, That all that Piece or Parcel of Land or Ground, in the Upper Heath, containing Two Hundred and Fifteen Acres, Three Roods, and Thirty-two Perches, or thereabouts: and also, all that Piece or Parcel of Land or Ground. containing Two Acres, Two Roods, and Fifteen Perches, fituate, lying, and being, in a certain Field, called Brick Field: and alfo, all that Piece or Parcel of Land or Ground, containing Four Acres, Two Roods, and Twenty-three Perches, fituate, lying, and being, in a certain Close, called Homers Close: and also, all that Piece or Parcel of Land, heretofore Part of Dancers, containing Thirty-two Perches: all which faid Pieces or Parcels of Glebe Land are fituate, lying, and being, in the Parish of Hitcham aforesaid, and were allotted and awarded to the Rector thereof, under and by Virtue of a certain Act of Parliament, passed in the Eighteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, entituled, "An Act for dividing and inclosing the Open and Common Fields, Common Meadows, Common Pastures, Commonable Lands, and Waste

Waste Grounds, within the Parish and Manor of Hitcham, in the County of Buckingham;" together with all and fingular Hedges, Ditches, Gates, Styles, and Fences, Ways, Passages, Waters, Watercourses, Woods, Underwoods, Timber Trees and other Trees, Commons, Common of Pasture, Profits, Emoluments, Advantages, Hereditaments, and Appurtenances, whatfoever, to the faid Glebe Lands, Hereditaments, and Premifes, or any of them, belonging, or in anywife appertaining, or accepted, reputed, taken, or known to be Part, Parcel, or Member thereof, or of any Part thereof; and the Reversion and Reversions, Remainder and Remainders, Rents, Issues, and Profits, of the same Premises, shall, from and immediately after the passing this Act, be settled upon and vested in, and the same are hereby settled upon and vested in, the faid William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, his Heirs and Affigns, to the Use of him the said William Wyndham, Lord Grenville, his Heirs and Assigns, for ever, in Lieu of, and in Exchange for, the said Closes, Pieces, and Parcels of Land, hereby vested in him the said Thomas Pulton, and his Successors, in the faid Rectory as aforesaid, freed and discharged, and absolutely acquitted and exonerated, of, from, and against, all Estate, Right, Title, Tythes, Claim, and Interest, whatsoever, of him the said Thomas Pulton, and his Successors, Rectors of the said Parish of Hitcham; any Law or Statute to the Contrary in anywise notwithstanding. .

And whereas the Land and Ground by this Act fettled upon, and vested in the said Thomas Pulton, and his Successors, Rectors of Hitcham aforesaid, are amongst other Lands, let upon Lease to the said Joseph Langton.

And he it therefore farther enamed that nothing herein contained, shall extend or be construed to extend to make void or annul the said Lease, but that the same, and every part thereof shall remain and continue in Force for the Remainder of the Term thereof, in such and the same Manner, as would or might have been, in Case this Ast had not been made.

Saving always to the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, and to all and every other Person and Persons, Bodies Politic and Corporate, their respective Heirs, Successors, Executors, and Administrators (other than and except the said William Wyndham Lord Grenville, and his Heirs, and the said George, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, and his Successors, Bishops of Lincoln, and the said Jonathan Davies, and his Successors,

Successors, Provosts of Eton College aforesaid, and the said Fellows, and their Successors, Fellows of the same College, and the said Thomas Pulton, and his Successors, Rectors of the Parish and Parish Church of Hitcham aforesaid) All such Estate, Right, Title, Interest, Claim and Demand whatsoever, of, in, to, or out of the said Closes, Pieces and Parcels of Land, Hereditaments and Premises, vested, settled, and exchanged by this Act respectively as aforesaid, as they, every, or any of them had before the passing of this Act, or could or might have had, held, enjoyed, or been intitled to, in Case this Act had not been made.
